SEAWOLF CLASS

The Seawolf class submarines are the latest nuclearpowered fast attack submarines (SSN) in service with the United States Navy. The class was the intended successor to the Los Angeles class, and design work began in 1983. A fleet of 29 submarines was to be built over a ten-year period, but that was reduced to 12 submarines. Seawolf submarines are larger, faster, and significantly quieter than previous Los Angeles-class submarines. They also carry more weapons and have twice as many torpedo tubes. The boats are able to carry up to 50 Tomahawk cruise missiles for attacking land and sea surface targets. The submarines are capable of diving to depths of up to 2,000 feet, and crush depth estimates run from 2,400 to 3,000 feet. At 353 feet long, Seawolf subs were designed to be slightly shorter than their predecessors, by just seven feet, but with a twenty percent wider beam, making them forty feet wide. CAIMAN was 311 feet long and 27 feet wide so the Seawolf class has a tad bit more room.

BIDEN VOIDS BAN ON TRANSGENDER MILITARY SERVICE

President Joe Biden issued an executive order that requires both the Pentagon and the Homeland Security Department (Coast Guard) to allow transgender individuals to serve in the military. "The all-volunteer force thrives when it is composed of diverse Americans who can meet the rigorous standards for military service, and an inclusive military strengthens our national security" according to a release from the White House. The Executive Order eliminates the previous administration's policy that began in July 2017, that prohibited transgender Americans to serve in the military. Biden's order immediately shuts down any involuntary separations or denials of continued service based on gender identity.

The White House release stated, "Simply put, transgender service members will no longer be subject to the possibility of discharge or separation on the basis of gender identity; transgender service members can serve in their gender when transition is complete and the gender marker in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) is changed and transgender service members should know that they are accepted throughout the U.S. military," The Executive order requires the Department of Defense and Homeland Security to report their progress in overturning the ban to the White House within 60 days.

VACCINES

VETERANS IN THE 117TH CONGRESS

15 served in the Air Force, Air Force Reserve or Air Gd

15 served in the Marine Corps or Marine Corps Reserv

17 served in the Navy or Naval Reserve.

SUBMARINE VETERAN

NAVY EXPEDITIONARY MEDAL

The Navy Expeditionary Medal is a military award of the United States Navy which was established in August 1936. Award Criteria: The General Orders of the Department of the Navy which established the medal states, "The medal will be awarded, to the officers and enlisted men of the Navy who shall have actually landed on foreign territory and engaged in operations against armed opposition, or operated under circumstances which, after full consideration, shall be deemed to merit special recognition and for which service no campaign medal has been awarded. The Navy Expeditionary Medal is retroactively authorized to February 12, 1874." Additional awards of the Navy Expeditionary Medal are denoted by service stars.

Classified Operations: Under the "deemed to merit special recognition and for which service no campaign medal has been awarded" clause, both the Marine Corps Expeditionary Medal (MCEM) and Navy Expeditionary Medal (NEM) have been awarded for classified operations with proper adjudication by the Secretary of the Navy Special Awards Board. The MCEM and NEM "can be authorized and awarded to individuals or units who have participated in classified operations not necessarily in connection with larger operations in which the public is aware." The SECNAV INSTRUCTION 1650.1H - NAVY AND MARINE CORPS AWARDS MANUAL details the process via the Special Awards Board for issuing classified awards. Anecdotal reports from former service members cite a wide variety of classified operations for which the MCEM and NEM have reportedly been awarded, ranging from Marine Corps units clandestinely deployed in Africa, to helicopter guncrews or force protection units assisting SEAL-DEVGRU or Delta Force teams worldwide, and even classified submarine operations during the Cold War. In cases where the Marine Corps Expeditionary Medal or Navy Expeditionary Medal has been awarded for classified operations, the name of the operation is omitted from public documentation including from the individual service member's DD214 personnel record with only the name of the award and issue date provided.

NOTE: If you survived a "spec op" you have earned this award. CAIMAN also earned the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal for furnishing support when North Korea captured the USS Pueblo.

If you think you are suffering memory loss!

In the following analysis the French Professor Bruno Dubois Director of the Institute of Memory and Alzheimer's Disease (IMMA) at La Pitié-Salpêtrière - Paris Hospitals addresses the subject in a rather reassuring way:

"If anyone is aware of his memory problems, he does not have Alzheimer's."

- 1. I forget the names of families.
- 2. I do not remember where I put some things.

It often happens to people 60 years and older that they complain that they lack memory.

"The information is always in the brain, it is the "processor" that is lacking."

This is "Anosognosia" or temporary forgetfulness.

Half of people 60 and older have some symptoms that are due to age rather than disease.

The most common cases are:

- forgetting the name of a person,
- going to a room in the house and not remembering why we were going there,
- a blank memory for a movie title or actor or actress,
- a wasting of time searching where we left our glasses or keys.

After 60 years of age most people have such a difficulty. These symptoms indicate that it is not a disease, but rather a characteristic due to the passage of years.

Many people are concerned about these oversights hence the importance of the following statement:

"Those who are conscious of being forgetful have no serious memory problem."

"Those who suffer from a memory illness or Alzheimer's, are not aware of what is happening."

Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of IMMA, reassures the majority of people concerned about their oversights:

"The more we complain about memory loss, the less likely we are to suffer from memory sickness."
