



COMMANDER'S SCUTTLEBUTT

Here's the latest scuttlebutt. For the first time in nearly 100 years, Idaho will have a naval vessel named after it. The USS IDAHO SSN 799, a Virginia-class, nuclearpowered, fast-attack submarine is scheduled to be commissioned this year at GD Electric Boat in Groton. Conn. Idaho has a rich relationship with the Navy. In the early 1950s, the first full-scale prototype nuclear plant for shipboard use, called S1W Prototype, was constructed at the Idaho National Lab near Arco, Idaho. It was the predecessor to the S2W design that was installed in the USS NAUTILUS SSN 571. In 1942, the Navy built Farragut Naval Training Station at Lake Pend Oreille in Idaho where nearly 300,000 recruits were trained during World War II. Bernie Ritscher, a Caiman Shipmate, was one of the first to go through basic training there. After the war the Training Center closed, and the Navy created the Acoustic Research Detachment there which has developed and tested every quieting improvement for our submarines. The lake is over 1,000 feet deep, which makes it a perfect location for this type of work. Our Vice Commander, Bob "Dings" Dengel and Renay live not far away from there. That's the latest scuttlebutt. Don't forget that we will be setting up a tour on a boat at Ballast Point during our reunion next year. So, if you feel that you can make it down and up the ladder, let us know if you will want to be included in the event. I spoke with the Public Affairs Officer on the base. He said it won't be a problem. They need us to give them notice two months in advance, so you have plenty of time to think about it.

SUBMARINES TO THE RESCUE

Submarine performed many rescues during World War II, but I have recently read about one I have not heard of before. There were many code breakers on Corregidor before the Japanese over ran the Philippines in 1942. The US could not let these men fall into Japanese hands. They knew too much. American code breakers had broken the Japanese diplomatic code. They were reading the dispatches between Japan and its embassies. They were making headway on the military code. Ernest King, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific Fleet, ordered the code breakers to be moved in shifts to Australia. In February 1942, the USS Seadragon (SS-194) took out the first shift of four officers and thirteen enlisted. The first shift made it to Australia and set up shop. While waiting to be rescued the second shift lost weight due to reduced rations. On March 16, 1942, the USS Permit (SS-128), originally sent to evacuate General MacArthur, (he left by PT boat earlier) took out four officers and thirty-two enlisted. Eventually all the officers and men made it to Australia and resumed their code breaking duties. They were successful in breaking the Japanese code which helped us win the war.

FREE ENTRANCE TO NATIONAL PARKS FOR GOLD STAR FAMILIES AND VETERANS

The Interagency Military Pass covers entrance fees and standard amenity fees (day use fees) at lands managed by the National Park Service, US Fish and Wildlife Service, US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, and US Army Corps of Engineers for current US military members and dependents of current military members, US military veterans, and Gold Star Families. In recent years, they were able to receive annual passes. The new interagency Military Lifetime Passes will be available starting November 11, 2022.

The free Military Pass waives entrance fees and does not cover expanded amenity or user fees for activities such as camping, transportation, special recreation permits, reservation fees or special tours.

<u>Cost</u>: Free Available for: Current US military members and their dependents in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard, and Space Force, as well as Reserve and National Guard members. US military veterans Gold Star Family members.

<u>How to obtain: In person</u>: Find a location to obtain this pass at a federal recreation site - <u>Places to Get Interagency Passes (U.S. National Park Service)</u>

(nps.gov). Online: Order this free pass from https://store.usgs.gov/MilitaryPass. There is an additional cost of \$10 for passes obtained online. (Check requirements at https://store.usgs.gov/faq#USMilitary before arriving, such as showing a Common Access Card (CAC) or Military ID (Form 1173) or exchanging a Gold Star Voucher.) Passes may not be issued as gifts since eligible recipients must present proof of eligibility.

TICKETS FOR VETS

Vettix.org is a website that is available to veterans to obtain free tickets to sporting events, concerts, and other entertainment events. Check it out at Vet Tix - Tickets

Vet Tix secures tickets to sporting events, concerts, performing arts, educational and family activities across the nation. VetTixers sign up online. We verify their service. VetTixers request tickets to events that interest them, then pay a small delivery fee to receive their free tickets. When you register on the website, you must provide proof that you are a veteran. Once that's done, you can set it up so that you get notifications via email of tickets that are available based on where you are located and what you are interested in. It's a great benefit.

TANG RETURNS

General Dynamics has laid the keel for the next Virginaclass submarine Tang (SSN 805). It's named after a lineage of naval vessels, with this being the third boat in the US Navy to bear the name. The first USS Tang, a WWII-era submarine, earned its place in history by sinking 33 enemy ships during five war patrols. Having a robust capability for anti-submarine warfare (ASW). Virginia-class vessels are also equipped with specialized weapons, sensors, and other equipment that enable them to perform land attacks, gather intelligence, conduct mine reconnaissance, and support special forces. With a focus on advanced capabilities, Tang (SSN 805) features the Virginia Payload Module (VPM), which provides the host submarine with the ability to embark the latest kinetic munitions. The VPM integrates four large-diameter, vertical payload tubes into the submarine's design, enabling it to deploy various resources, including weaponry, unmanned undersea vehicles, and other essential payloads.
